## So You Want to Be a Firefighter!

One of the first questions you need to answer is whether you plan on being a career (municipal firefighter, airport, industrial etc.) or volunteer firefighter.

If the answer is <u>volunteer</u>, the first step is <u>to join a fire</u> <u>department</u>. Membership in a volunteer fire department opens up a number of opportunities; the first of which is State sponsored firefighting training.



Firefighter training begins with enrolling in the entry level training course, "Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations" (BEFO); whether you are interested in being a part of the fire-ground activity and exterior firefighting or interested in interior firefighting, which, as the name implies, requires the training and skills to wear full turnout gear, Self-contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) and the skills to perform the job which includes actually entering burning buildings.

BEFO currently consisting of 25 classes totaling 79 hours. BEFO students will receive training covering firefighter personal protective equipment (PPE) to self-contained breathing apparatus inspection; fire department communications to building construction; hose and fire streams to Hazardous Materials First Responder Operations and much more. Those who successfully complete this intensive program are rewarded with confidence that comes from a proficient knowledge base and hands-on training.

For those interested in responding to emergencies as an interior structural firefighter, your next step is to enroll in the "Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA)/Interior Firefighting Operations (IFO) Course. The SCBA/IFO course consists of 16 classes totaling 50 hours. Students will expand on the skills acquired through BEFO and acquire fire search and victim removal techniques, firefighter survival skills; basic power saw operations and more.

After completing the "entrance level" formal training course, the new member will then review the Standard Operating Procedures, rules, and regulations with their respective fire departments.

For those who are looking toward a <u>career in firefighting</u>, the successful completion of a Civil Service firefighter exam is required in most cases. Check with your local government Civil Service Department for a listing of openings or upcoming civil service title tests. In many cases, "rank" on the list of potential appointees is determined based on the scores of the written test. Upon successful completion of the written test, potential candidates are also required to complete the Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT). The CPAT is a practical exam used to test a candidate's physical ability to perform a job task related to firefighting. CPAT is a physically demanding test that requires a candidate to use his or her physical, mental abilities and, in some cases, balance. The CPAT involves eight events that must be complete in 10 minutes, 20 seconds.

Aspiring firefighters may want to consider enrolling in a Fire Science program to obtain an "Associates in Applied Science Degree" (AAS) in Fire Protection Technology. Locally, Monroe Community College (MCC) and Erie Community County (ECC) offer this program. The Fire Science program provides a tremendous base from which a person can build their career.

As individuals consider "fire" as a career, keep in mind that fire offers a wide range of specialties and vast opportunities after successful appointment. Specialized fields in training, fire inspections, sprinkler system design, apparatus design and maintenance, emergency planning, drills and exercise development, are just a few of the specialized areas, in addition to management positions and administrative roles.
